

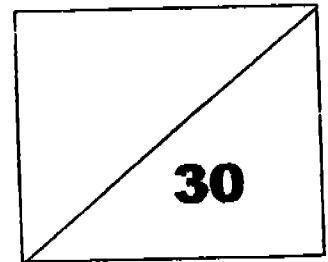

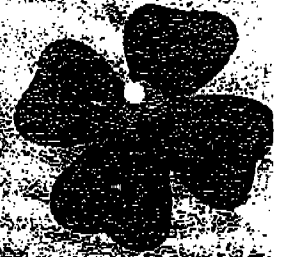

There is nothing bigger than the Olympics in this year's sporting calendar. Come August 13, the sporting greats of the world will gather at Athens for the 28th staging of the modern Games.

Although the Greeks held their first sports gathering some 2 700 years ago, the modern Games started only in 1896. 5

Another historical note: Singapore won her sole Olympic medal way back in 1960, when Tan Howe Liang lifted that priceless weightlifting silver in Rome.

Singapore is expected to be represented by swimmers, sailors and athletes too. They are not medal earners but local sportsmen who, after years of toil and sacrifice, deserve to be there – to soak in the atmosphere, garner inspiration and rub shoulders with their idols and other world beaters. 10

It should be a good Olympics, provided the scorching Greek summer does not prevent the human body from jumping higher, running faster or throwing further.

The focus of the Olympics must surely be on the swimming pool, where the traditional United States - Australia battle will be personified by Michael Phelps and Ian Thorpe respectively. While Thorpe should dominate the freestyle races, all-rounder Phelps will be out to better compatriot Mark Spitz's 1972 record of seven gold medals in Munich. 15

In the last Olympics, Phelps, then 15, became the youngest American to compete in the Sydney Olympics, finishing fifth in the 200-metre butterfly. 20

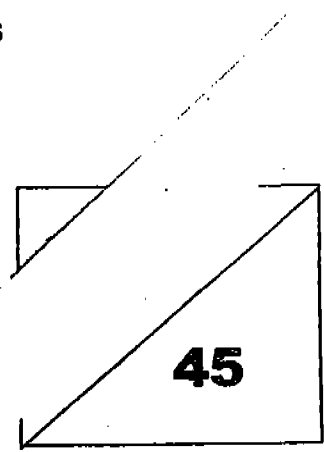

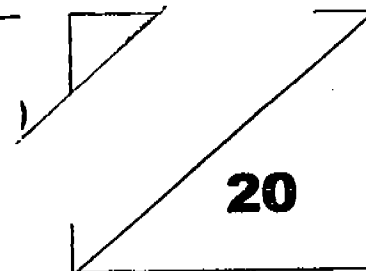
